The list below offers some possibilities for research projects. You should feel free to revise any of these or use a subject completely of your own choosing. These are simply some possibilities to spur your thinking. Yager's Yellow Pages may also be a source for ideas, especially if you want to consider the possibility of giving a presentation at the site of a particular work.

Bear in mind that for a brief paper or report you should choose a subject sufficiently focused so that you can cover it in some depth. Subjects such as "The Renaissance" or "Impressionism" are far too broad for the project at hand. Also, remember that the focus of your research should be on the visual arts. If, for example, you chose to present some aspect of an artists work you should focus on the work and such things as its formal qualities, its impact on the history of art or society, its innovative vision, etc. Though you might include pertinent biographical information about the artist in such a project you should avoid making it primarily a biography of the artist. <u>Remember that</u> resources in English can be difficult to find on the trip so you might consider taking them with you or doing the bulk of your research before the trip begins. Projects should be approved by me before you get too far into them. I will be happy to help you in defining your project both before and during the trip.
